About this Session: Brian Bell, Counsel to the U.S. House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, returns to discuss the federal relief programs that are providing airport grants and MAG/rent relief for airport concessions, and the prospects for the Biden Administration's infrastructure proposal—the American Jobs Plan. The T&I Committee, chaired by long-time aviation ally Rep. Peter DeFazio (D-OR), is the lead committee for aviation, airport and transportation legislation, programs and oversight in Congress. The Committee will play a major role in shaping the infrastructure bill and airport funding initiatives. Brian will discuss what it means for airports, concessionaires and ACDBEs and what we can expect from Congress in the months ahead to help the aviation industry, airports and concessionaires recover from the pandemic and return to a growth trajectory.
